Greg Gianforte Biography

Greg Gianforte (born April 17, 1961) is an American engineer, businessman and political activist.

Greg and his wife founded RightNow Technologies, a cloud-based software company, in an extra bedroom of their home in Bozeman Montana. Under his leadership, the company grew to more than 1,100 employees worldwide and more than \$225 million in annual revenue becoming Bozeman's largest commercial employer and Montana's only publicly traded technology firm. RightNow served about 2,000 of the world's largest consumer firms like Nike, Motorola and AMEX becoming one of the world's 100 largest web sites in terms of traffic.

Greg has also authored several books, including "Bootstrapping Your Business: Start and Grow a Successful Company With Almost No Money," and has lectured on the topic at leading business schools worldwide.

Gianforte holds a B.E. degree in electrical engineering and an M.S. degree in computer science from <u>Stevens Institute of Technology</u>. Gianforte began his career at <u>AT&T Bell Laboratories</u> and was one of the engineers on <u>AT&T</u>'s <u>StarLAN</u> Network project.

Gianforte co-founded Brightwork Development Inc., a developer of network management applications. Gianforte served as president and built the company to 75 employees with software installed on 150,000 Novell network systems, and then sold the business to McAfee Associates in 1994. Retained by McAfee, Gianforte went on to serve as North American VP, where the company's North American sales operation grew from \$25 million to more than \$60 million in revenues in less than a year.

Gianforte founded RightNow Technologies in 1997 which went public in 2004 and was sold to Oracle Corporation for \$1.5 billion in 2011.[1]

President's Update - February 2015

It's hard to believe we are just a week away from Transmittal Break, when most non-revenue bills must pass the originating house to stay alive in the Session. A lot is happening both in Helena and here in the Flathead giving me much to report.

Our top two goals in the Session are the establishment of a trade and tourism office in Calgary, and the approval of sewer and water infrastructure funding for Kidsports.

We are making **an all-out effort** to pass SB 244 to better realize the market potential of nearly 2 million Canadians just across the border. The bill, sponsored by Sen. Dee Brown, passed out of the Senate today on third reading by a margin of 29-21 and will now move on to the House. We had good support from the Flathead delegation, with all of our senators voting in support of the bill, and Kalispell Regional Medical Center supports too. The Canadian dollar is weakening and Alberta's oil economy is flagging. So, this bill has taken on added importance.

The Kidsports leadership team believes they are in good position with funding through the Treasurer State Endowment Program. We have offered to help in any way that we can both through our Helena consultants and our staff.

House Majority Leader Keith Regier and Senator Mark Blasdel will meet with our Board of Advisors during the Transmittal break and provide a legislative update. We will use the meeting as an opportunity to highlight our legislative agenda and hear what issues are on the minds of our major investers.

Regional Trade Center

The planning board workshop on the Spring Prairie IV development, which will bring 263,454 square feet of new retail and restaurant space to Kalispell, was held last week. The board asked several

questions about water drainage, site lines, and traffic flow that the developer will address prior to the planning board hearing. This is a good addition to the retail offerings of Kalispell and further solidifies Kalispell's commercial trade center status. **We will offer strong support** at the March 10th hearing.

We understand that a strong regional trade center requires a strong central business district. That is why we are making downtown Kalispell a high priority this year. Last week, Ed Toavs, the regional administrator for the Montana Department of Transportation addressed our Transportation Committee. Later that day, he met with downtown merchants. Ed has been a huge supporter of ours since his days as the district engineer in Kalispell and is committed to completing the project.

To advance downtown we need to complete the Bypass, and to complete the Bypass we need full, multi-year funding of the federal highway bill. I emphasized this point with Sen. Tester on a highway infrastructure panel last week and we will continue to make this point at every opportunity possible.

During Toavs presentation, he encouraged the City to more fully-develop the downtown plan to include more input for the State and it's contractor completing the highway traffic study. Further, he encouraged the City to form an advisory committee to achieve broad citizen input. This is good advice, and I have informed the Mayor that I am willing to serve on a committee like this.

Manufacturing and Technology

Manufacturing and technology jobs offer an opportunity to deliver great benefits to our economy and quality of life. Greg Gianforte will visit with us at our February meeting. We have affiliated with his Montana High-Tech Business Alliance and he asked me, and I have agreed, to participate on his CEO Roundtable. As the founder of Right Now Technologies, few in Montana are in as good a position to help Montana chart a course to grow more high-wage technology jobs.

The Chamber will be a sponsor for Manufacturing and International Trade Day at the Capitol on March 16-17. Ambassador Baucus will be the keynote speaker at the dinner event. We will use the event to showcase Flathead manufacturers, the breadth and quality of products made in the Flathead, and the Manufacturers Alliance that supports the policy agenda and promotion of these businesses.

Speaking of more manufacturing jobs, the housing market is starting to rebound and bring a greater demand for wood products. Sen. Daines has invited me to participate on a Roundtable to develop comprehensive forest management reform legislation to grow jobs and improve forest health. Timber availability is the major constraint for Montana's mills. It is time to free national forest lands which are now producing just a fraction of their sustained yields.

<u>Infrastructure</u>

In addition to the passing long-term highway and aviation bills, there is a tremendous amount of work to be done right here in the Flathead. The AERO group raised \$235,000 for a minimum revenue guarantee last year to secure weekly, winter seasonal direct service to Chicago. The flights appears to be performing well, but we will not know the final results until June. I serve on a group that is prioritizing future markets. We have agreed on this list in priority: 1) maintain Chicago winter direct service, 2) twice weekly to Chicago, 3) San Francisco, 4) Portland.

Trade and Tourism

The Pond Hockey Tournament will take place at Woodland Park this weekend. Come join the fun with 61 teams registered to participate. The festivities start at Moose's on Thursday evening.

Flathead County rules require a Conditional Use Permit to hold the Dragon Boat event in Lakeside. We will hold a Public Forum at the Lakeside Town Center on February 24, from 4:30-6:30 pm to gather public input.

The Vacation and Community Guide is now being edited with a print run of 30,000 planned. The publication is produced in cooperation with the Daily Inter Lake once again. If you missed your advertising opportunity this year, make plans to join us next year.

I will continue to keep you informed of progress to establish a trade and tourism office in Calgary.

In March, I will attend the Chamber of Commerce Committee of 100 meeting with the US Chamber. I will use this opportunity to visit with our congressional delegation and, if time permits, with the DC staff of our members. When meeting with the members of Congress and their staff I will emphasize our federal agenda:

- Full, long-term funding of the highway and aviation bills and top projects: 1) bypass, 2) TIGER grant for the Kalispell Rail Park
- Federal land use policy managed for greater timber supply
- Free movement of people and goods between Canada and the US
- Glacier National Park
